The less paper, the better. Thanks to digital tools, you can use electronic tickets, boarding passes, and guides.



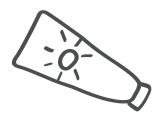
Try to use recycled or eco-friendly suitcases or backpacks. Cloth covers help protect your luggage.

- Be mindful of energy use: Turn off lights, A/C, and electronics when leaving your room. Unplug devices you're not using.
- Conserve water: Take shorter showers, turn off the tap when brushing your teeth or shaving, and reuse towels and bedding to reduce laundry loads.
- Minimize plastic use and recycle properly: Bring a reusable water bottle, cloth bags, and containers. Avoid single-use plastics whenever possible. Follow local recycling rules at the hotel and in the area.
- Use reef-safe sunscreen
- Respect the culture and natural environment: Don't take natural souvenirs like shells, rocks, or plants. Respect wildlife—don't get too close to animals. Avoid activities that exploit animals, such as elephant rides or dolphin shows.
- Support local communities: Participate in cultural experiences and buy handmade local products. This supports the community and gives you unique, authentic souvenirs.
- Choose responsible tour operators: Look for those offering sustainable tours that prioritize environmental conservation and community respect.
- Volunteer if you can: If time allows, consider helping with environmental or community-based volunteer projects.
- Respect people and places: Follow all posted rules and local customs during your visit.
